First notice:

It feels like I write the same opening sentence to all of my Headteacher comments at the moment - We are currently living through unprecedented times! The first two weeks of the Spring term have been unlike any two weeks I have ever experienced in my time in education. The challenges that we have been presented with could have been overwhelming but as a community we have been strong and resilient.

I am hugely thankful to you all, pupils, parents and staff, for the support and kindness that you have shown this past fortnight. It is incredibly encouraging as a Headteacher to know that I have the confidence of our community when the difficult decisions need to be made. On Wednesday 6 January, Education Secretary Gavin Williamson informed parents that if they had any complaints regarding the provision schools were offering, then they could log them on the Ofsted website. Within 2 days, the Ofsted website received over 5000 **positive** comments from parents in support of schools. This made me incredibly proud, both as a parent and as a Headteacher.

Currently we are educating approximately 25% of our pupils in school and 75% remotely. The staff team have worked incredibly well to provide a high quality learning programme online. If, however, you are finding that your child is not engaging in the learning online, please call the school to discuss possible ways in which we can help. It may be that you decide that you feel it would be best for your child to come into school. We will respect your decision and welcome your child in school.

T&L Notice from Deputy for Teaching and Learning—Katherine Healy

Welcome back to the Spring Term! We have had to really pull together as a team and as a school in order to enable our school to open and for pupils to start learning remotely with very short notice this term, but we are pleased with how the term has started.

Over the last 2 weeks, engagement in online and paper-based learning stands at 71%. Whilst this is high, there are still a number of pupils who have yet to fully engage and there are also a number of pupils from the 71% who are not accessing the full timetable of lessons their teachers are providing for them. Please encourage your child to try to keep up with their learning and let the school know if your child is having difficulty accessing so that we can support as best we can.

We have just released on our website a Remote Learning Handbook which outlines steps to be followed in order to access the work on Google Classroom and also expectations of learning from pupils, parents and teachers. A copy is attached to the email of this newsletter.

Independent Learning Task

As a school, we have decided to pause the ILTs whilst remote learning is in place. This is due to the large amount of independent learning which is taking place and being monitored by staff.

Google Classroom and pupil timetables

All pupils are following their normal school timetable and schedule of lessons. This has been shared with all pupils on Google Classroom. Please contact the school if you wish a copy to be emailed to you.

Google Classroom has not yet developed their platform to allow parental access (without you asking your child for their login details and passwords). Currently, parental involvement is in the form of 'Guardian email summaries'. *Please contact the school if you wish to receive the email summaries.*



Google Classroom

What's included in an email summary?

- Missing work—Work not turned in when the summary was sent.
- Upcoming work—Work that's due today and tomorrow (for daily emails) or that's due in the upcoming week (for weekly emails).
- Class activity—Announcements, assignments, and questions recently posted by teachers.
 Guardians who sign up for email summaries can't see the Stream, Classwork, People, or Grades pages in Classroom.

How to get guardian summaries?

- A teacher or admin sends an invitation to a guardian.
- After a guardian accepts the invitation, they choose when to get email summaries for each of their students.

When do guardians get summaries?

Guardians can get emails daily or weekly and can unsubscribe at any time. Guardians won't get an email summary if:

- There's no activity to report for the given time period.
- All their student's teachers turned off notifications for their classes.
- They accepted the invitation but chose not to get any summaries.
- They aren't connected to any student in Classroom.

On Friday 22nd January (from 11.45am to 11.15pm) students will have a masterclass with SCOPE, the disability equality charity in England and Wales.


They offer a careers service for SEND students called Career Pathway.


Remote Learning—As pupils and staff settle into the term and become more accustomed to remote learning, engagement rates are rising.




