Symptomatic people will be isolated in the Courtyard garden area if weather permits. If it is too cold, the symptomatic person will be isolated in the Pod space.</p> <p>999 will be called if they are seriously ill or injured or their life is at risk.</p> <p>In the case of a symptomatic pupil who needs to be supervised before being picked up:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • If a distance of 2m can't be maintained, supervising staff will wear a fluid-resistant surgical mask • If contact is necessary, supervising staff will also wear disposable gloves and a disposable apron • If there's a risk of splashing to the eyes, such as from coughing, spitting or vomiting, supervising staff will also wear eye protection <p>Supervising staff will wash their hands thoroughly for 20 seconds after the pupil has been picked up.</p> <p>If there are home testing kits available in school, these will be given to parents/carers collecting symptomatic children, and to staff who've developed symptoms at school, if providing one will increase the likelihood of them getting tested.</p> <p>Only in exceptional circumstances will staff take symptomatic children home themselves, and in this case one of the following steps will be taken:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Use of a vehicle with a bulkhead (i.e. the driver is in a separate compartment to any passengers); or • The driver and passenger will maintain a distance of 2m from each other; or • The driver will use PPE (the same PPE as when supervising a symptomatic pupil, as explained above) and the passenger will 			<p>hours only</p> <p>Only essential visitors will attend the Courtyard for meetings.</p>

The school will consider all circumstances and the latest public health advice when making this decision.</p> <p>A deep clean will take place in the areas that the symptomatic person has been in, and PPE will be disposed of properly, following decontamination guidance.</p> <p>If the school becomes aware that a pupil or a staff member has tested positive for coronavirus, the school will contact the local health protection team. 		<p>sickness absence where coronavirus is suspected, the school will work with the local health protection team to decide if additional action is needed. Any advice given by the team will be followed.</p> <p>If the school becomes aware that a pupil or a staff member has tested positive for coronavirus, and needs advice on next steps, the school will contact the DfE helpline on 0800 046 8687 and select option 1. (If no advice is required, the school will report the case using the DfE’s ‘online attendance form daily return’). The advice service (or local health protection team, if the call is escalated to them), will carry out a rapid risk assessment to confirm who’s been in close contact with the person when infectious.</p> <p>The school will ask (using a template letter from the local health protection team) all close contacts to self-isolate for 10 days from the day they were last in close contact or to take a daily lateral flow coronavirus test each morning for 7 school days. If the test is positive, we will follow the same steps (laid out above) as if that pupil/staff member were displaying symptoms, including asking them to take a standard coronavirus test at home. If the test is negative, we will ask them to continue taking daily lateral flow tests for the remainder of the 7 days. They can attend school as long as they continue to test negative.</p>

Spreading infection due to touch, sneezes and coughs		<p>Handwashing facilities will be provided.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Two sinks in the toilet areas. • Two sinks in the kitchen are. • Four hand sanitation units located strategically around the school. <p>Everyone in school will:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Frequently wash their hands with soap and water for 20 seconds and dry thoroughly using NHS guidelines, or use alcohol-based hand sanitiser to cover all parts of their hands • Clean their hands on arrival, after breaks, if they change rooms, before and after eating, and after sneezing or coughing • Be encouraged not to touch their mouth, eyes and nose • Use a tissue or elbow to cough or sneeze, and use bins for tissue waste <p>Pupils will be encouraged to learn and practise these habits in lessons and by posters put up across the school.</p> <p>Help will be available for any pupils who have trouble cleaning their hands independently. Spreading infection through contact with coronavirus on surfaces		<p>Cleaning staff and SLT will regularly clean frequently touched surfaces using standard cleaning products (e.g. bleach, detergent), including:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Classroom desks and tables • Bathroom facilities (including taps and flush buttons) • Door and window handles • Furniture • Light switches • Reception desks • Teaching and learning aids • Books and games and other classroom-based resources • Computer equipment (including keyboards and mouse) • Sports equipment • Telephones • Outdoor play equipment <p>Items that need laundering (e.g. kitchen towels) will be washed regularly in accordance with the manufacturer's instructions, on the warmest water setting. However, unnecessary sharing will be avoided, especially where it doesn't contribute to pupil education and development.</p> <p>Individual and very frequently used equipment, like pens and pencils, will not be shared.</p> <p>Therapy equipment, such as physiotherapy or sensory equipment, will be cleaned between each use. 		<p>require teachers or other performers to raise their voices if they don't have to. Microphones will be used to avoid the need for shouting or prolonged periods of loud speaking or singing. Where possible, microphones, instruments or other equipment won't be shared.</p> <p>During music lessons and performances, pupils will be positioned either back-to-back or side-to-side at an appropriate distance. Singing or instrument playing will only take place in assemblies if there's enough natural airflow and space to allow for strict social distancing between each person (at least 10l/s/person natural airflow for all present, including audiences).</p> <p>For physical activity, we will follow the same guidance for cleaning equipment and grouping pupils as in all areas of the school. Outdoor sports will be prioritised where possible, - where it is not, we'll use large indoor spaces with sufficient ventilation. Distance between pupils will be maximised as much as possible.</p> <p>For team sports, we will follow the return to recreational team sport framework. For individual sports, we will follow the guidance on the phased return of sport and recreation.</p> <p>Staff can work with all pupils in order to deliver the school timetable, but they will keep their distance from pupils and other staff as much as they can (ideally 2 metres apart). This won't always be possible, but close face-to-face contact will be avoided, and time spent within 1 metre will be minimised.</p> <p>Any pupils with complex needs or who need close contact care will have the same support as normal as distancing isn't possible here. Staff will be rigorous about hand washing and respiratory hygiene.</p> <p>Specialists, therapists, clinicians and other support staff should provide interventions as usual. These staff will be advised to be rigorous about hand washing and respiratory hygiene.</p> <p>The school will remain open for our pupils regardless of lockdown Tier.</p>
